## Shoes on the Mantelpiece

His new parents took those old clothes, threw them away and bought him beautiful new clothes. They bought him a bike and more toys, and pretty soon he began to feel just like all the other kids in the neighbourhood loved and part of a family. One thing however was curious. The young boy's old shoes, the ones with the big holes in them, weren't tossed out with the rest of his clothes. His new father placed them on the mantelpiece. It wasn't long before the newly adopted son found out why. Every time that boy did something wrong his father would go and get those shoes and say "Look at all we've done for you. ### Moral:

Unfortunately we can do the same thing all too often in our relationships. We dredge up the past and throw it back in someone's face, never letting them forget how much they're in our debt. Forgiveness means throwing out the shoes as well as the clothes. "The Word was made Flesh and dwelt amongst us" - from the Angelus Prayer and today's Gospel ... means Jesus came to pay the price of our sinfulness - He can only do that for us if we learn from the mistake of the father in the story above.
