Practise what You Preach ... Otherwise your children will practise what you practise.

Advent is a holy season in which we are challenged to prepare for the coming of the Infant Jesus - so it is important to examine any *inconsistencies* in our attitudes ... and to confess them in His Honour. One of those states of mind is ... *saying one thing and doing the opposite* - as in the above story ... the adult challenging the child about his inconsistency while not noticing her own.

The subtle point of the anecdote is that the child noticed all too clearly ... they pick up on and imitate every little nuance of our character - especially parents, grandparents and significant others. That is why adults need the Advent season - to examine more closely the impact we have on the next generation by our words and actions. Confession is a wonderful way of examining our consciences especially motivated by the impending arrival of the ultimate Child on Christmas Day.

The first candle, purple in colour, is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle". It is meant to remind us of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It also stands for John the Baptist who was the last prophet just before Jesus' Birth, who this very day in the Gospel, is calling us to prayer and penance as the time is nigh ...
