Congratulations to the First Communion class on the celebration of their special day last Sunday. After a long delay the children tell me they really enjoyed the occasion and it seems like we were very fortunate as things have turned out since.

Please note From midnight on Tuesday 6th October - Level Three of the Government's 'Resilience and Recovery 2020-2021: Plan for Living with Cov19' involves the following implications for Church practice:

- 1. Public Masses cannot be celebrated from midnight 6th October 2020.
- 2. All other ceremonies cease for the duration of Level Three: First Holy Communion, Confirmation, Baptism and the Sacrament of Penance etc.
- 3. The following exceptions are allowed:
- (a) Funeral Masses with up to 25 mourners.
- (b) Marriages with up to 25 guests.
- Churches may remain open for private prayer, with adequate sanitising measures.

The public health guidelines mention 25 mourners at funerals and 25 guests at marriages, these figures do not include the priest, sacristan, ushers etc. they are in addition to the twenty five persons allowed.

Reflection: When James Harrison was 14 years old, he nearly died. It took a major chest operation to save his life. The surgeons had to remove one of his lungs, allowing 2 litres of blood leave his body in the process. He only survived, Harrison understood, because people he'd never met had donated the blood that now filled his body—and he wanted to do that for someone else.

Harrison resolved that, as soon as he was old enough, he would donate blood as often as he could. He went through with it, donating his first pint of blood on his 18th birthday.

Doctors started to realize, though, that Harrison's blood was unusual. It had antibodies that were basically the cure for *rhesus disease*, a blood disorder that can cause babies to be born with crippling brain damage or even die.

They asked Harrison to donate plasma regularly and let them run tests, and he agreed. His blood became the cure. Harrison, now in his seventies, has saved the lives of more than *two million babies*.

He didn't just save stranger's lives, though. When his own daughter, Tracey, became pregnant, she was diagnosed as being at risk for rhesus disease. Harrison's blood donations ensured that her baby was born safely. Because he donated blood when he was 18, James Harrison was able to become a grandfather.

Moral:

"The measure you give without cost is the measure you will receive in return." - Lk 6:28. Today's Gospel is the spiritual version of this true story - the amount we give to the Lord is the amount we will be given back when we die. If I am willing to give freely of my time to putting God first in my life - Prayer ... Mass ... Devotion - then He will return the favour when I need it most. Likewise the opposite is also true.
