Reflection: The Important Things in Life

A philosophy professor stood before his class with some items on the table in front of him. When the class began, he picked up a very large and empty mayonnaise jar and proceeded to fill it with stones, about 2 inches in diameter. He then asked the students if the jar was full. They agreed that it was. Next the professor picked up a box of pebbles and poured them into the iar. He shook the iar lightly. The pebbles, of course, rolled into the open spaces between the stones. He asked the students again if the jar was full. They agreed it was. The professor picked up a box of sand and poured it into the jar. Of course, the sand filtered down between all the other stuff. He then asked once more if the iar was full. The students responded with a unanimous "Yes." "Now." said the professor. "I want you to recognize that this jar represents your life. The stones are the important things - your family, your health, your children - things, that if all else was lost and only they remained, your life would still be full. The pebbles are the other things that matter - like your job, your house, your possessions. The sand is everything else; the small stuff," "If you put the sand into the iar first," he continued, "there is no room for the pebbles or the stones. The same goes for your life. There will always be time for the other things".

Amazingly, the professor asked again: "Are you sure that the glass is finally full?"
"Absolutely," they answered. Then he took a cup of water and proceeded to pour it into the jar. The water percolated through the material in the jar until the cup was completely empty. "The water," he said, "stands for the Lord. Unless your life is saturated with His Spirit, then your life will never be complete."

Moral: Mary knew what is most important in life - the jar is never full until the water of the Spirit permeates all of our being.
