Reflection: Very large crowds attended the church services of the famous Rev. Martin L. King. One Sunday, the Reverend King's sermon was based on the topic of forgiveness. He urged the congregation not to harbour grudges against those who had offended them. Reverend King asked everyone to stand. He then said: "Those of you who forgive past grievances-please be seated." About half of those in the church sat down. The preacher quoted many Biblical verses that urge forgiveness, and repeated his question to those still standing. At this point most sat down. He pleaded further for them to follow the Christian way and one by one they sat down. Just one old lady remained standing. "Madam," Reverend King asked - "Why can't you forgive your enemies, being the good Christian that you are?"

"Because I have none!", she replied.

Reverend King was taken aback and exclaimed: "That is remarkable - at your age - to have no enemies ... truly amazing ... truly astonishing! To what do you attribute this unbeard of achievement?" Not a whisper could be heard in the auditorium ... All ears strained to hear the old lady's explanation for her amazing ability to forgive her enemies ... She gave the Reverend her best wry smile, chuckled to herself, and replied; -

"The old biddies have all died!!"

Moral: It is virtually impossible of forgive our enemies by human strength alone. Only the grace of God can give us the power to do so. That grace comes to us only through profound prayer and the grace Jesus gives us in Holy Communion.

However, if we don't try to forgive, psychological research tells us again and again that resentment will fester and do us more harm than our enemy. Here's how the great African American Civil Rights leader, Rev. Martin L. King Inc. explains its-

"Now there is a final reason I think that Jesus says, "Love your enemies." It is this: that love has within it a redemptive power. And there is a power there that eventually transforms individuals. Just keep being friendly to that person. Just keep loving them, and they can't stand it too long. Oh, they react in many ways in the beginning. They react with guilt, and sometimes they'll hate you a little more at that transition period, but just keep loving them. And by the power of your love they will break down under the load. That's love, you see. It is redemptive, and this is why Jesus says love. There's something about love that builds up and is creative. There is something about hate that tears down and is destructive. So love your enemies, (from 'Loving Your Enemies").
