I recall the story of a student who attended just the first class of the semester and did not show up again until the final exam. He scored 95% on the exam. The professor was shocked because she knew he hadn't come to class all semester. She wrote "See me" on the cover of the exam. After the exams were passed back and the class was over, the student approached the professor and said, "You wanted to see me about my exam?"

The professor responded, "Yes. How did you get a 95 on that exam?". The student answered, "Well, it would have been 100, but I went to your first class and got confused."

Moral: Sometimes the experts complicate things too much - the genius/ prophetic figure sees through the maze of details to the light at the end of the tunnel. "The first shall be last and the last shall be first" is just such a prophetic statement meaning: "Those who have heard His message and do not take it seriously will be last to enter Heaven and those who take His message to heart will be the first to enter Paradise".

Fritz Kreisler (1875-1962), the world-famous violinist, earned a fortune with his concerts and compositions, but he generously gave most of it away. So, when he discovered an exquisite violin on one of his trips, he wasn't able to buy it. Later, having raised enough money to meet the asking price, he returned to the seller, hoping to purchase that beautiful instrument. But to his great dismay it had been sold to a collector. Kreisler made his way to the new owner's home and offered to buy the violin. The collector said it had become his prized possession and he would not sell it. Keenly disappointed, Kreisler was about to leave when he had an idea. "Could I play the instrument once more before it is consigned to silence?" he asked. Permission was granted, and the great virtuoso filled the room with such heart-moving music that the collector's emotions were deeply stirred. "I have no right to keep that to myself," he exclaimed. "It's yours, Mr. Kreisler. Take it into the world, and let people hear it."

Moral: The collector recognised genius/prophet when he heard the incredible playing - and realised that keeping this instrument in cold storage would be a crime. Do you/I recognise the ultimate Genius/Prophet figure every time we receive Him in Holy Communion.
