Reflection

A wealthy Jewish business man was travelling on a train. An old, inconspicuous looking man with a limp shuffled into the seat opposite him. He had a bad chest and so ensued intermittent bouts of coughing. This irritated the business man who was wading through some crucial documents for the meeting at the next stop. Finally, he could take no more and in a rude and disdainful manner he let the old man know of his displeasure. The elderly gentleman felt shocked and humiliated in front of the other passengers but said nothing, and snuffled his cough as best he could for the rest of the journey. Soon they arrived at their common destination. The businessman was surprised to find the station thronged with passengers who, on seeing the old man disembark from the carriage, broke into cheers of jubilation. They had assembled to welcome one of the holiest and most famous rabbis in Europe. The business man now realises, to his great chagrin, that the saintly rabbi is non other than the old man he has just insulted. Talk about putting your foot in it. Embarrassed at his disgraceful behaviour and distraught that he had missed a golden opportunity to speak in privacy to this renowned and revered leader of his own religion, he anxiously pushes his way through the crowd to get near the old rabbi. When he reaches him, he clasps the old man's arm and with great compunction of heart begs his forgiveness, then requests his blessing. The old rabbi looked steadily at him and replied. "I cannot forgive you, much as I will it myself: to receive forgiveness you must go out and beg it of every poor old person in the world.

Moral: There's a bit of this story in all of us. Every time we place some person above another in judgement we are right in the middle of it. The Lord is reminding us to learn from our mistakes, for according to St. Thomas a Kempis, this one stops him answering our pravers: A humbled contribe heart, I will never spurn.

We pray for the humility of heart necessary to overcome this particular businessman in all of us.
