So the man, along with the entire village, was hugging the side of the road in breathless anticination.

And sure enough, at about mid-day, the King's impressive entourage was seen approaching the village. And the beggar man knew this was his chance. As the King passed by, he shouted and jumped and called on the King to have mercy on him:

"ALMS FOR THE POOR! ALMS FOR THE POOR! HAVE MERCY ON A POOR, UN-FORTUNATE BEGGAR!"

To the surprise of the entire village, the King stopped and walked over to the beggar. Even more surprising was what the King said: "Has your life been one of only misery, and no joy? Surely you have something you can give me to bless my day." And he looked down at the beggar's bowl with rice in it and said: "How about giving me some rice?
