Advent Safeguarding Message 2020 from Bishop Francis.

The last nine months have been very difficult for many people with the continuing threat to health, lives and livelihood.

As we prepare for Christmas during this season of Advent we remember that Jesus Christ was born into a family and there he grew up. Although Church activities have been restricted for most of this year our commitment to safeguarding children continues.

I thank Parish Safeguarding Representatives and our priests for their thorough and vigilant work in ensuring the safety of children and adults at risk in our Church related activities.

Reflection: On an exam paper during final exams at seminary, a student wrote these words: "Only God knows the answer. Merry Christmas." With that, he went home for the holidays. Upon his return to school, he received his graded test paper, on which the professor had written: "God gets an A. You get an F. Happy New Year!"

It's a humorous story but with a very serious warning ... assuming is not a good idea ... especially with our spiritual lives. "Stay awake for you do not know the day or the hour" - warns the Greatest Spiritual Director of them all.

"The clinical diagnosis is pancreatic cancer. His life expectancy is six months."

With those words, then 62 year old John Brandrick of Cornwall, England, decided to go out in style. He quit his job and stopped paying his mortgage. He emptied his savings account and sold all that he had (except the black suit in which he planned to be buried). He then spent every pound he had, enjoying expensive dining, entertainment and travel. But as time went by, Brandrick's health didn't deteriorate as expected. A subsequent scan revealed that he didn't have cancer at all. "It was such a relief," Mr Brandrick said after hearing the news. "But that wrong diagnosis has left me in financial ruin."

Moral: Rather than living like we might die *today*, most of us live like *we'll never die at all*. It's this "wrong diagnosis" that leaves us ill prepared for what awaits us when we stand before God to give an account of our lives during our short stay down here.

Professor Eugene Griessman outlines research that reveals "Patterns stored in memory are the key to competence in any field." One spectacular example is that of the great chess masters ... They learn to recognize between 15,000 and 50,000 possible patterns on a chess board. Astonishing as that may be, it is even more important to establish patterns in our Spiritual Life as all the great saints tell us.

Spiritual *Patterns*: Prayer, Mass, Devotions and following the Seasons like Advent and Christmas are so essential to our spiritual growth.

The wreath and candles are examples of *patterns* tied to the Christmas season. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God and the everlasting life we find in Christ. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one candle is lit each Sunday. Three of the candles are purple which signifies a time of *prayer*, *penance and almsgiving*. Even the individual evergreens on the wreath have their own meanings. The laurel signifies Jesus' victory over persecution and suffering. The pine, holly, and yew signify His gift of immortality and the cedar signifies the strengthening gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Advent is a time for examining our assumptions - a year is one more revolution (pattern) by the earth around the Sun - Sadly, I have only a limited number of these circles (patterns) to complete ... "Stay awake!" Jesus counsels us today. So let us ask ourselves: At what point are we on our little circle of life? ... How many more times have we left to go around it? ... All we know is that, in 2020, we have one more chance to adapt ourselves to the pattern of the Advent season ... so as to be truly present to the infant in the Manger when He comes this Christmas. "Stay Awake", the Lord says ... meaning ... For we don't know about the next one ...
